Experiences of UK and Irish family carers of people with profound and multiple intellectual disabilities during the COVID-19 pandemic

People with profound and multiple intellectual disabilities (PMID) have high and intensive support needs that ordinarily place significant strain on family carers. This was further heightened by the removal of many external supports during the COVID-19 pandemic. We sought to explore the experiences of family carers of people with PMID during the COVID-19 pandemic and understand what the longer-term impact might be on their lives.

The biosocial correlates and predictors of emotion dysregulation in autistic adults compared to borderline personality disorder and nonclinical controls

Emotion dysregulation (ED) is a core symptom of borderline personality disorder (BPD), whose aetiology has been attributed to biosocial factors. In autism spectrum condition (ASC), although ED is prevalent and is associated with decreased well-being (e.g. self-harm, suicidality), it has been understudied, especially in adults. It is therefore crucial to further understand ED in autistic adults to improve its treatment.

Caregiver-child interaction as an effective tool for identifying autism spectrum disorder: evidence from EEG analysis

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a complex neurodevelopmental disorder that affects individuals across their lifespan. Early diagnosis and intervention are crucial for improving outcomes. However, current diagnostic methods are often time-consuming, and costly, making them inaccessible to many families. In the current study, we aim to test caregiver-child interaction as a potential tool for screening children with ASD in clinic.

The early life growth of head circumference, weight, and height in infants with autism spectrum disorders: a systematic review

The Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) prevalence has increased significantly over the past two decades. This review summarizes the current knowledge of the association between the early life growth of head circumference (HC), weight, and height with ASD in infants.

Strategies to improve the magnetic resonance imaging experience for autistic individuals: a cross-sectional study exploring parents and carers' experiences

Autistic individuals encounter numerous barriers in accessing healthcare, including communication difficulties, sensory sensitivities, and a lack of appropriate adjustments. These issues are particularly acute during MRI scans, which involve confined spaces, loud noises, and the necessity to remain still. There remains no unified approach to preparing autistic individuals for MRI procedures.

"Work with us... to make it more accessible". What women with intellectual disabilities want from infant-feeding health resources: an exploratory study

More women with intellectual disabilities are becoming mothers but fewer are known to breastfeed compared with other women. Women with intellectual disabilities are entitled to accessible antenatal and infant feeding information, yet are rarely asked for their views on available resources. This article reports on the final stage of a UK project exploring how women with intellectual disabilities are supported to make infant feeding decisions. The wider project includes a scoping review and interviews with healthcare professionals, here we focus on the voices of the women themselves.

Latest NHS data shows sharp rise in waiting times for first autism appointment

The College has raised concerns about a huge gap in NHS resources for specialist autism services. New data published by NHS England shows that between July and September 2023, people in England who had an appointment for suspected autism had, on average, waited almost ten months since their first referral. This compares to 2022, when on average, people waited for almost seven months to be seen.

Autism assessment waiting times

As of September 2023, 157,809 people were waiting for an autism assessment in England, new NHS data has revealed. This is a 50% increase in the number of people waiting in just one year.

New figures published today by the Mental Welfare Commission show that 17, 849 Scots were living with a welfare guardianship order in March 2023, the highest level recorded, and a 4.4% increase on 2022.
