<u>Did I Take My Medication Today? Understanding Medication Self-Management for Adults With Intellectual Disabilities Through Participatory Research</u>

There is little research that has examined what support strategies are effective to help adults with intellectual disabilities take their prescribed medication correctly. The aim of the study was to gain an understanding of the barriers and supports that contribute to adults with intellectual disabilities self-managing their prescribed medicines.

<u>Safer Online Lives: Internet Use and Online Experiences of Adults With Intellectual Disabilities—A Survey Study</u>

The internet and social media are increasingly accessible to people with intellectual disabilities, offering significant benefits but also posing unique challenges and risks. This study aimed to explore the online experiences of adults with intellectual disabilities in England.

Impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on antidepressant prescribing with a focus on people with learning disability and autism: an interrupted time series analysis in England using OpenSAFELY-TPP

COVID-19 restrictions led to increased reports of depressive symptoms in the general population and impacted health and social care services. We explored whether these changes affected antidepressant prescribing trends in the general population and those with learning disability or autism.

Your baby has down syndrome: a reflexive thematic analysis of breaking the news to parents. The communication of a Down syndrome diagnosis to mothers is a pivotal moment that can impact their emotional well-being and the subsequent care for their child. This study aimed to explore maternal experiences with receiving a Down syndrome diagnosis.

Resistance and resilience to Alzheimer's disease in Down syndrome

Due to the high prevalence of Alzheimer's disease (AD) in adults with Down syndrome (DS), trisomy 21 is now considered a genetic form of AD (DSAD). A better understanding of factors that can prevent or delay AD is vital to improve outcomes for adults with DS.

Sociodemographic and clinical indicators associated with quality of life among parents of autistic children

Evidence suggests that parents/carers of autistic children have lower subjective physical and mental health which in turn can affect their overall quality of life (QoL). The aim of this study was to determine the relationship between the behavioural and emotional profile of autistic preschool children, parental stress, and an Autism (ASD) specific measure of the parental QoL using a sociodemographic lens.

"I made friends a lot more easily": children and families' experiences of social group programs for children on the autism spectrum

Social Skills Group Programs (SSGP) target the social communication and interaction skills of children on the autism spectrum. This qualitative study explored lived experiences of children and families who participated in a randomised controlled trial (RCT) evaluating the efficacy of KONTAKTTM adapted for younger children (8 to 12 years) in comparison to an active control social art group (ART Legends).











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<u>Dialectical behavior therapy in autistic adults: effects on ecological subjective and physiological measures of emotion dysregulation</u>

Although Ecological Momentary Assessment (EMA) and physiological measurements provide a valuable opportunity to evaluate therapeutic interventions in real time, no study has used this approach to assess Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) in autistic adults with high levels of emotion dysregulation (ED).

<u>Where Care Converges: Uncovering Shared Experiences of Parents and Service Providers for</u>
Adults With Intellectual Disabilities in Times of Austerity

Since the introduction of austerity measures in 2008, funding for care, welfare, services and support systems in the United Kingdom has been reduced. There is little research that explores the experiences of parents of adults with intellectual disabilities and service providers regarding care, relationships and social networks in times of austerity.

<u>Sex-specific patterns in social visual attention among individuals with autistic traits</u>

Autism is a neurodevelopmental condition more prevalent in males, with sex differences emerging in both prevalence and core symptoms. However, most studies investigating behavioral and cognitive features of autism tend to include more male samples, leading to a male-biased understanding. The sex imbalance limits the specificity of these features, especially in female individuals with autism. Hence, it is necessary to explore sex-related differences in behavioral–cognitive traits linked to autism in the general population.

<u>Effectiveness of Artificial Intelligence–Based Platform in Administering Therapies for Children With Autism Spectrum Disorder: 12-Month Observational Study</u>

A 12-month longitudinal observational study was conducted on 43 children aged 2-18 years to evaluate the effectiveness of the CognitiveBotics artificial intelligence (AI)-based platform in conjunction with continuous therapy in improving therapeutic outcomes for children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

Longitudinal investigation of gait and Alzheimer's disease in adults with Down syndrome

Gait abnormalities are associated with Alzheimer's disease (AD) in the general population, but it is unclear if the same is true for individuals with Down syndrome (DS). This study examined gait across 32 months in relation to neuroimaging biomarkers (amyloid beta $[A\beta]$, neurofibrillary tangles [NFTs], and hippocampal volume), cognitive decline, and clinical AD status in adults with DS.
