A considerable knowledge, skills and confidence gap must be addressed to support the implementation of new care pathways that include revised responsibilities for GPs. GPs need appropriate support and resources to manage their patients' changing needs and to provide the best possible pharmacological management as the disease develops.

Insomnia Can Age the Brain

A new study adds to growing evidence that persistent sleeplessness may set the stage for Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia. It found that compared to their peers who sleep more soundly, older men and women with chronic insomnia had a 40 percent higher risk for dementia or mild cognitive impairment, a serious form of memory loss that often leads to full-blown dementia.

A Sense of Purpose May Bolster the Brain

Having a strong sense of purpose in life may help protect the aging brain, according to a new report. The study found that people who reported a higher sense of purpose in their lives were about 28 percent less likely to develop memory and thinking problems as they aged compared to their peers who had little sense of purpose.
