Despite the fact that there have been many studies on the connection between autism and psychosis, there are still many things that are unknown about the significance of this connection. Recent studies have highlighted the significant overlap between autistic traits and psychotic disorders, yet the clinical implications of these associations are not well understood.

Children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), particularly those from families with low-income, experience inequities across educational and health outcomes.
