Traumatic Experiences, Psychological Distress and Suicide-Related Behaviors in Autistic Adults Autistic adults have increased risks of trauma, suicide, and poor mental health compared to non-autistic adults, with 1 in 4 autistic adults attempting suicide.

Learning disabilities and adolescent suicidal ideation: Findings from the z-proso cohort study Objective: To investigate suicidal ideation among adolescents with learning disabilities and examine whether learning disabilities and a range of risk and protective factors assessed at age 13 are associated with suicidal ideation at age 15.

Cancer in adults with intellectual disability: a systematic review of prevalence and incidence The epidemiology and pattern of cancer in people with an intellectual disability is poorly documented. Emerging evidence reports that a different profile and trajectory of cancer burden is experienced in this population. The prevalence and incidence of cancer in this group have not been systematically synthesised.

A Systematic Review of Autistic Adults' Experiences of Anxiety From a Qualitative Perspective Many autistic adults experience anxiety in ways that are qualitatively unique when compared to the experiences of non-autistic adults. In this systematic review we aimed to explore these experiences from a first-person perspective through a synthesis of qualitative evidence.

Neurodiversity-Affirming Dialectical Behaviour Therapy (NDA-DBT) Informed Group Skills Training Programme for Autistic Adults: A Pilot Study

Research suggests that standalone dialectical behaviour therapy (DBT) skills training results in reduced emotion regulation difficulties, depression, and anxiety across various clinical populations. Although autistic individuals experience heightened emotion regulation difficulties compared to the general population, limited research is available on the effectiveness of DBT for autistic populations, particularly adapted DBT programmes to meet the specific needs of the autistic community.

Effects of a repeated reading intervention on the reading fluency of adolescents with intellectual disability

Although repeated reading (RR) is highly effective in improving reading fluency, it has not been sufficiently studied in students with intellectual disability. This single-case experimental study with multiple baselines across participants examined the effects of an 8-week adapted RR intervention, on reading automaticity [i.e., correct words per minute (CWPM)] and accuracy [i.e., errors per minute (EPM)], in three adolescents with intellectual disability.

Ableism in Applied Behavior Analysis: A Beginner's Guide to Understanding and Dismantling Ableism in Practice with Autistic People

Ableism is biased covert behavior or overtly discriminatory actions against people who are disabled. Ableism often involves words and actions that convey an attitude or belief that disabled people are inferior to nondisabled people, irrespective of whether the person holding these views (i.e., private events) is aware that their thoughts are biased or actions are discriminatory. All people have biases that have grown out of their exposure to harmful social norms, models, and observational learning as well as experiences and contingencies.







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<u>Facilitators and Barriers to Employment of Neurodivergent Individuals: A Systematic Literature</u> Review of Employee and Employer Experiences

While employment rates amongst neurodivergent adults are notoriously low, little is known about their experiences in the workplace and their contribution to innovation and productivity in the labour market. At the same time, the views of colleagues and employers with regard to the inclusion of neurodivergent adults in the workforce are important.

<u>Misunderstood, Minimised, Misrepresented: Autistic Young Adults' Experiences of Epistemic</u> Injustices in Healthcare Interactions Around Autism

This article explores autistic young adults' experiences of epistemic injustice in healthcare interactions where autism is invoked and a subject of misaligned sensemakings.
